We directed almost \$50,000 to local artists through our Artist Grants and Alternate Currents programs. These programs gave artists access to holistic channels of support (financial, critical, and logistical) to:

- develop new work
- evolve their creative practices, and
- connect with their communities

Our 2021 grant recipients expanded their creative practices in new and innovative ways – organizing incredible projects and exhibitions, and building capacity to continue proposing alternatives to the status quo and helping us envision more just and equitable futures. Our 2021 Alternate Currents program explored questions surrounding institutional futures in both digital and real space, culminating in the first ever collaborative publication from the Alternate Currents Working Group – an anthology titled *Given All This: Collective Institutional Futures*.

Why do we champion local artists and this work? We firmly believe that artists, not organizations, are the lifeblood of a cultural community. When artists have access to the resources and opportunities they need to thrive, our city becomes a more vibrant place to live.

GENERATOR GRANTS




Generator Grants encourage creative risk taking by assisting Omaha area artists through the entire process of organizing, marketing, and presenting a curated group exhibition, performance, or project. These project grants provide funding and space that enable artist-generated content to take shape outside of larger institutional systems.

ALTERNATE CURRENTS

In 2021 the <u>Alternate Currents</u> program explored questions around the theme of 'Institutional Futures,' examining the relationship between artists and cultural institutions, and cultural institutions and Omaha as an Indigenous place. Through the blog, bimonthly panel discussions, and working group, Alternate Currents makes space for conversation, ideation, and action around national and international discussions in the arts, and uplifts cross-sector dialogue and artist-driven community change.



ALTERNATE CURRENTS WORKING GROUP




Given All This: Collective Institutional Futures features research and work by Working Group members in response to broad questions around the theme of 'Institutional Futures' – Given the pandemic, given renewed calls for racial equity and justice, given the accelerated impacts of a changing climate – *all this* – the collected works in this publication are not offered as "solutions" to institutional failings, but rather as invitations to more critically examine the ways in which our cultural institutions might become a collective commons to question where we've been, how we've changed, and what the future might hold.

The Alternate Currents Working Group is a cohort of 10 artists and culture workers who meet monthly over the course of a year to develop project-based work in response to the central theme of Alternate Currents for that year. Group members lead monthly discussions informed by critical readings, receive peer generated feedback and logistical project support, contribute editorial content to the blog, and share their work via collaborative exhibition or publication


